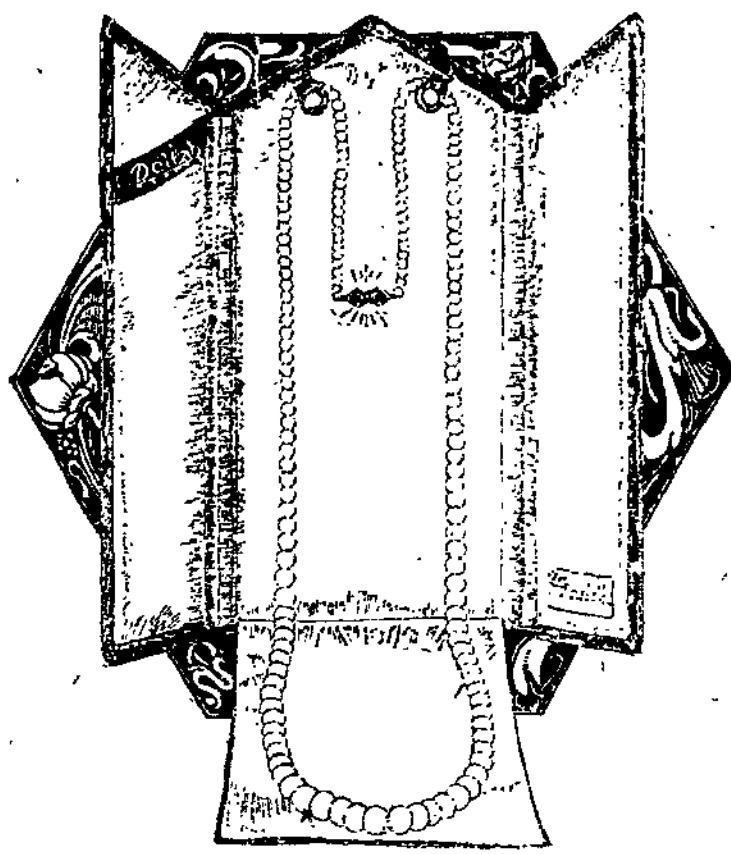

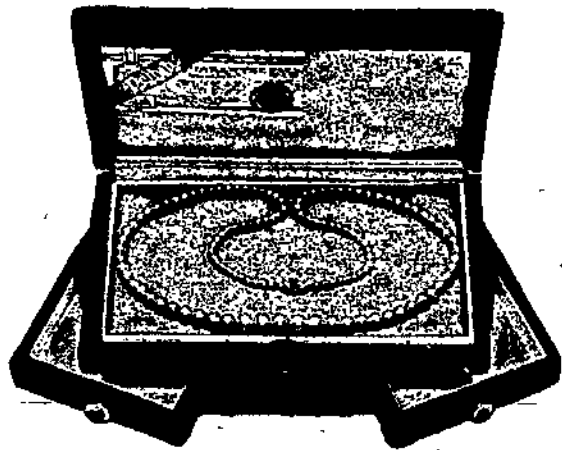

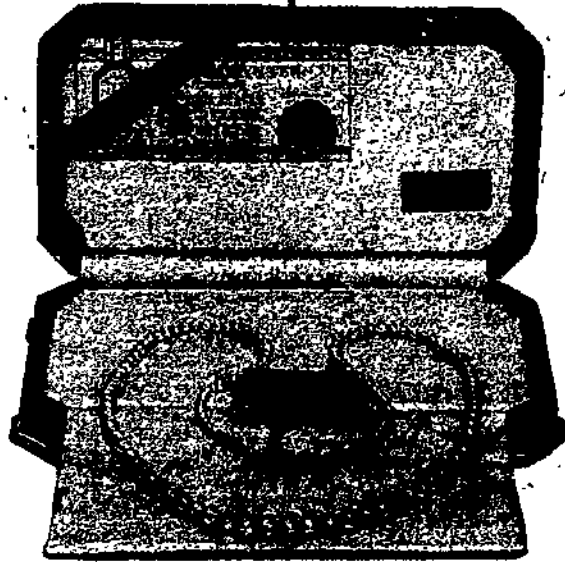

NEW POWER PLANT READY FOR BUSINESS

And the People of Menasha Will Shortly Be Utilizing Electric Energy Generated and Purveyed by the Municipality—A News Letter

Menasha, Wis. — The new engine recently purchased by Menasha taxpayers from money earned by the water and light plant, was put in operation at the city plant last evening for the first time.
Supt. J. H. Kuester ordered a light lead attached to the engine and it performed most satisfactorily.
When a full load is carried, local patrons will be using electric energy generated by the city and supplied through the municipal plant.
Current has been purchased from the W. T. L. H. & P. company the last six years at an approximate average of \$1,200 per month.

HEAVY-HANDED DINERS WRECK TABLEWARE

(By Associated Press.)
London—The average daily crowd of 70,000 people eating in the numerous restaurants at the Wembley exhibition are responsible for the smashing of 30,000 pieces of crockery every six days. In an average week the breakages are 781 broken cups, 345 dozen saucers, 422 broken plates and 771 dozen miscellaneous pieces, according to the firm which has the contract for feeding the visitors.
These figures do not include glasses broken in the drinking saloons, and it is stated that it is no uncommon thing in a busy week for one bar to smash 1,500 glasses. As there are some fifty-four bars in the exhibition, it is apparent that the number of glasses smashed since the exhibition opened in April must be about 700,000.

theory, that abnormal tides mean the approach of an earthquake.
Mr. Maeda quotes figures for the tides just before the disastrous earthquake of Sept. 1, 1924. At that time, he says, the tides were so high that the fishermen along the coast, who eke out a living by gathering seaweed in the shallows, complained that the water was so deep in their accustomed hunting grounds that their industry was sadly crippled. Then the big quake came. Mr. Maeda also recalls that excessively low tides preceded an earthquake which did considerable damage in Tokyo and the surrounding country in April, 1922.
Dr. Melko Inomura, head of the seismological department of the imperial university of Tokyo, admits that there may be some relation between tides and earthquakes, but declares that Mr. Maeda's theory is borne out in only about one case in five and is not yet acceptable.
